

Would you like to increase the frequency of your speech pathology sessions?

At NeuroBloom we are considering employing a *Speech Pathology Assistant*. A Speech Pathology Assistant works under the guidance of a qualified speech pathologist to deliver evidence based programs to help you or your child reach your goals.

For example, if you are currently seeing us fortnightly and would like to have weekly sessions with speech, you could keep your regular fortnightly appointment with your speech therapist and add another appointment with the Speech Pathology Assistant on the alternate week.

Another way a Speech Pathology Assistant could be used is to deliver services at school in addition to your regular appointment at our clinic.

This can help to enhance outcomes in therapy by speeding up the process through more regular practice. A Speech Pathology Assistant is also significantly less expensive than working with a speech pathologist, and is covered by your NDIS plan (they can also be paid for privately if you do not have NDIS).
